

SPOTLIGHT ON GERMANY

Germany has long valued creativity and technology. Its numerous public and private film schools, whose students and graduates have won prestigious international film awards, are spread across the country.

In addition to its creative talent, Germany boasts a number of renowned film studios responsible for high-quality international productions. Studios such as MMC in Cologne. Studio Hamburg, Media City Leipzig, Bayaria Studios. and Studio Babelsberg are notable examples. The country is also at the forefront of virtual production, with Penzing Studios near Munich emerging as a global leader in digital and virtual production.

To ensure continuous growth, reliable funding is essential for the German film industry. Creativity, art, culture, and economics are deeply intertwined, supporting and complementing one another. Federal and state policies provide a robust support system that creates significant incentives for both domestic and international productions. Beyond state funding, such as the German Federal Film Fund and support from the Federal Government Commissioner for Culture and the Media (BKM), the media industry also benefits from public and private broadcasters. Germany, with nearly 40 million TV households, over 200 channels, and a market volume exceeding 10 billion euros, is one of the largest and most diverse TV markets in the world. Additionally, several federal states offer production funding, with the largest institutions in Munich, Berlin, Stuttgart, and Düsseldorf, collectively providing around 120 million euros annually.





FILMING IN GERMANY

Great Britain, France or Italy - why might Germany be the best film location in Europe?

Germany offers almost every landscape and backdrop you can think of: fantastic islands and seas, majestic mountains and picturesque valleys, idyllic forest landscapes, rivers and lakes. World famous Hollywood stars like Tom Cruise, Liam Neeson, George Clooney, Oliver Stone and Wes Anderson have filmed in Germany - and would like to do it again.

Either ancient ruins, castles or palaces, even perfectly preserved medieval towns, spiritual churches or monasteries, pristine natural landscapes, backdrops of the Second World War or futuristic architecture: location scouts always find what they are looking for. And although Germany's castles and palaces still are the biggest attraction for international producers, outstanding locations in Frankfurt, Hamburg, Giessen and, of course, Berlin are also used as filming locations for various productions.

Apart from the impressive backdrops - what else speaks for Germany?

With its remarkable film history, Germany simply fulfils all requirements of professional film productions - and exceeds them by far: the highest standards in film technology, modern studios with professionally trained and English-speaking crews and creative minds in all areas and trades are a reliable standard.

The local producers and service providers are not only highly skilled, they also offer first-class services. German VFX Companies such as RiseFX ("Avengers: Endgame"), Trixter ("Black Widow"), ScanlineFX ("Gemini Man"), Mackevision ("Game of Thrones") and BigHugFX ("Ben Hur") are already known for creating high-quality visual effects for the most famous productions, proving once again the quality and visionary creativity of the German film industry.

A LEGACY OF EXCELLENCE

The Academy Awards, or Oscars®, have long been a stage for celebrating As Germany continues to produce compelling films and performances, global cinematic achievements, and Germany has consistently played a notable role in this prestigious ceremony. In recent years, German cinema has garnered increasing attention, with films, directors, and actors making their mark on the international stage.

One of the standout achievements for German cinema at the 2023 Oscars® was the recognition of Sandra Hüller, a highly regarded German actress. Hüller made headlines for her performances in "The Zone of Interest" and "Anatomy of a Fall", both of which received critical acclaim. "The Zone of Interest", a chilling drama set outside the Auschwitz concentration camp, was shortlisted for Best International Feature, Hüller's dual performances in these two films made her one of the most talked-about actors of the season, although she narrowly missed out on an Oscar® nomination. Her growing international profile showcases the talent emerging from Germany's acting community.

This recognition comes alongside Germany's other notable 2023 Oscars® successes. The film "All Quiet on the Western Front" (German: "Im Westen nichts Neues") dominated the 95th Academy Awards, winning four Oscars®, including Best International Feature and Best Cinematography. The film, directed by Edward Berger, vividly portrays the horrors of World War I through the eyes of a young German soldier. Its success at both the Oscars® and the BAFTAs, where it won seven awards, reinforced the strength of German storytelling and technical prowess in film.

Germany's recent achievements extend beyond the Oscars®. In the television realm, while no German actors were individually nominated at the 2023 Emmy Awards, the broader contributions of German filmmakers, particularly in documentary and technical categories, continue to reflect the country's influence in the entertainment industry.

SUBSIDIES AND FINANCING POSSIBILITIES IN GERMANY

NATIONAL AND REGIONAL FILM INCENTIVES.

There are numerous and various financing opportunities in Germany, also through German co-productions. Aside from incentives on a national level. a number of regional film funds provide additional support to productions of any budget. Nearly all German federal states provide grant funds and additional soft money depending on local expenditure. More than € 520 million go into national and international film projects every year. The application procedure is basically the same at all regional funds: The most important thing to remember is that you will need a German co-producer.





3 QUESTIONS: DIRECTOR JOHANNES GUTTENKUNST

The technical possibilities for the creative realization of ideas in film production are now more extensive than ever before. What does it mean for you as a filmmaker when technology finally no longer limits creativity?

Development of technology and storytelling has always been fascinating to me. From the creation of the first visual effects to the magnificent technology we have today, movie directors have always loved to capture movie technology, take it to the next level, combine it, and that is what we are going to do in our science fiction movie "Transport": we are going to combine different technologies - from visual effects to special effects to practical effects to virtual production.

You have to have the overview as the director, that your project - which is nowadays filmed in different countries around the world - is still the film which you have in your head. Because of that we do a 100% previsual of the entire film. The previsual has everything; the voices of the protagonists, all the scenes, and we can add the final picture to the previsual and step by step generate the final film. Technology, when used correctly, can greatly assist in creating a movie.

The advantage of a previsual is that you already know when you start filming if the storytelling of your filmworks. That makes working with visual effects very inspiring.

With the series Tesla, you're tackling a subject that has exceptional relevance today in times of technological transformation. What's next? Can you talk about one of your upcoming projects, and what makes it so special for

Working on the five part miniseries with Christopher Lloyd on the forgotten genius Nikola Tesla was a great experience. We physically filmed all around the world to follow Nikola Tesla's footsteps, not just in a scientific way, at Harvard, MIT, etc, but also from a supernatural standpoint. Today there are people who admire Nikola Tesla not just for his inventions, but also for his ideas and philosophies.

This series, which is coming out in early 2025 is really interesting not just for science geeks, but for anyone who loves science fiction movies as well. And yes, sure the biggest project coming up for me right now is the adaptation of a very famous science fiction novel the principal shooting is set for next year. In the story of the book we are taken all throughout the universe by our protagonists in a transporter.

So yes, exciting things are coming up.

How do you think the transformation of the entertainment industry, shaped by technology and changing audience behavior, will play out? Where do you see opportunities?

I see where you are going with this question about artificial intelligence, AI, KI in movies. There is a lot of stuff out there. People talking about how in the future we won't be needing writers and directors anymore because our storylines can be created by AI. Same thing with graphic artists or animators, or even up to actors; who are already being marked as "unimportant" in the near future.


I personally don't believe any of that. Of course, with all technology there comes change. Starting with editing, I still learned editing on a 35 millimeter. Nowadays that's all digital, and while certain jobs were lost, certain new jobs were also created. The same thing will happen with Al. Someone has to operate the technology and this more less will be a producer or director who understands storytelling and technology.

I believe that AI technology will help make phenomenal movies, but there is



VTFF - THE ASSOCIATION OF TECHNICAL SERVICE PROVIDERS

Berlin in February 2024. The German capital is in the spotlight with the Berlinale, the famous film festival. Legendary director Martin Scorsese receives a Golden Honorary Award, and global stars such as Sharon Stone, Matt Damon, and Cillian Murphy walk the red carpet.

Just a few kilometers away from Potsdamer Platz, the center of the Berlinale, a green carpet is being rolled out. At the Cinegate Studios, exhibitors from Germany and abroad present cutting-edge green technology for sustainable, low-carbon production processes in the film and television industry. The future-oriented trade fair, named "Green Tec Day," was successfully organized by the Association of Technical Operations for Film and Television (VTFF). VTFF is the voice and network of the technical-creative service companies for film and television in Germany. Its members come from areas such as outside broadcasting, camera and lighting rental, costume design, studio and post-production, as well as visual effects (VFX).

The association's more than 70 members represent well over half of the market volume of technical-creative service providers in the German film and television industry. The four largest film studios in Germany are all organized under the VTFF. Prominent members include legendary production sites like Potsdam/Babelsberg and Bavaria Studios in Munich, leading VFX company Trixter GmbH, and the Oscar®-winning Arri Rental Deutschland GmbH. For many years, the Berlin-based Theaterkunst GmbH, Europe's leading costume house, has also been a member of the VTFF. Extensive service provider studies conducted by the association show that Germany's technical-creative service providers possess excellent infras-

tructure and highly skilled personnel that are in demand for international productions. Despite the current economic challenges following the COVID pandemic and the Hollywood strike, VTFF members are investing in future technologies such as Virtual Production and are already integrating Artificial Intelligence (AI) into the preparation and execution of film and television productions.

The association, led since 2021 by Achim Rohnke, former head of Bavaria Film GmbH, is well-connected within the film and TV industry and represented on all important committees. For example, VTFF has a seat and voting rights on the board and commissions of the Filmförderanstalt (FFA), the key institution of the German film industry, which sets the framework for the German film and TV industry. VTFF is currently deeply involved in the reform of German film funding, which aims to significantly enhance the international competitiveness of the German film industry. 


